Mobile Mast Delayed

Fyfield faces a further delay in receiving a good mobile phone signal

Last September, EFDC granted permission for a 15m Mobile Phone Mast to be erected on a site at Lower Houchin Field.



Telefonica UK would have provided the service by this summer. However, there are complications with this location and a further number of potential sites in the village are under consideration and will shortly be tested for technical suitability.

This, of course, will require a new planning application which will delay any improvement in the service initially by at least 56 days for statutory EFDC approval and then by however long Telefonica take to schedule and build the mast.

Village Hall Looks to the Future with Refurbishment Plans

As from this month, the Village Hall will take over occupancy of the Club Room from the Sports & Social Club and implement plans for the refurbishment of major parts of the Hall. Plans include:

- A disabled Toilet in the Monica Couling Room
- Complete refurbishment of the Club Room
- Upgraded Changing Room & Showers
- New entrance to the Hall
- Resited & re-equipped Kitchen
- A Veranda on the front of the Hall

Once the Club Room is completed there are plans to open the bar on a regular basis providing a pleasant facility located in a peaceful setting with outstanding views over the Sports Field and Roding Valley.

Letter from the Reverend Christine Hawkins



I'd like to begin my first letter for 'The Fyfield Focus' by saying a huge "thank you" to all the Churchwardens and people of the four parishes within the benefice for all their support since I was appointed as the

new Priest-in-Charge of Bovinger, Fyfield, Moreton and Willingale.

My husband and I are both Essex people and we're delighted to have the opportunity of living and working back in our home county after a brief spell in Lincolnshire. I cannot tell you what a thrill it is to drive through the lanes around these beautiful villages, especially at this time of year. I consider myself to be blessed beyond measure.

In fact, my own feelings of being blessed led me to investigate an informative and stimulating book – 'Sharing God's Blessing'. It's written by Robin Greenwood who once worked for the Diocese of Chelmsford and who is now William Leech Research Fellow at St John's College, Durham University. Greenwood's book invites us all to realise how blessed we are – even in the midst of some struggle and pain. It also speaks to churches, addressing what Greenwood calls "the myth of scarcity", enabling we who are the church to see that although we are beset with the problems of declining church attendance and reduction in clergy numbers, 'the church' is greatly blessed.

At the time of writing, we are using the book as the basis for five conversations during Lent to explore the theme of blessing together.

I hope these beginning conversations will form the basis for further conversations and discussions both within the existing benefice and beyond as we look forward to joining with the parishes of Matching and The Lavers later this year. There will be challenges ahead, for sure, but also great blessings if we look for them.

As we travel on through the season of Lent and await the great blessing of the festival of Easter, may I encourage all of you all to look for the blessings in your own lives and situations and then to share these in conversation with one another. We are bombarded with so many stories in the news and media that have negative connotations and a cynical edge; stories that blunt our spirits and encourage us to expect the worst in life. Robin Greenwood's book is the antidote to this and prompts us to remember that we are blessed, not merely on the odd occasion, but on every day that we are alive. I cannot tell you how thrilled I am to be back in Essex, to have been called to be the Priest-in-Charge here and to be able to pass on the 'Good News' that we are blessed beyond measure; that each day is a re-birthing – an opportunity to live life in all its fullness.

I look forward to the blessing of meeting many of you in the weeks and months that lie ahead.

Licensing of The Reverend Christine Hawkins

Several weeks ago I was surprised and honoured to receive an invitation to the Licensing of The Reverend Christine Hawkins as Priest-in-Charge of the United Benefice. The Licensing was to be conducted by The Right Reverend Stephen Cottrell, Lord Bishop of Chelmsford and the Installation by The Reverend Canon Dr Joyce Smith Area Dean of Epping Forest and Ongar. The service to be held at the Church of St. Nicholas, Fyfield.

When I arrived in Fyfield village there were cars parked everywhere. The reason for so many cars soon became apparent on entering the church. Although I was in good time, the building was packed, with nearly every pew taken. Despite extra chairs fitted into every available space, some of the guests had no option but to stand for the entire service.

The fairly complex procedure that was to follow was clearly explained in the ten page Order of Service. After a welcome by the Area Dean, this important ceremony started with the Lord Bishop, resplendent in robes, mitre and carrying his crook, apologising for a couple of minutes late start by explaining his spectacles had just broken and were kindly repaired by one of the Church Wardens. This set the tone for the ceremony, reverent but with a touch of humour that I am sure went towards relaxing all those that took part. The new Minister was presented to the Bishop and later, representatives of the church community gathered round the new Minister and ceremoniously present spiritual objects. The declaration and oaths followed. The Bishop then read the licence

and gave it to the new Minister. Towards the end of the ceremony the Installation took place. This consisted of the Area Dean presenting the new Minister with the keys to the church. The Bishop then presented The Reverend Christine Hawkins to the people.

Following the formal licensing, refreshments were provided. Because of the number of people present we were treated to waitress service at our seats. A pleasant surprise was to be offered a glass of Prosecco together with delicious sandwiches. Tea and homemade cakes



ended a very interesting afternoon.

A queue formed at the exit, not because of the heavy rain outside but everyone wanted to wish Christine well in her new post. We all wish her a hearty welcome to the United Benefice.

FOOD BANK

We are delighted to tell you about a new cooperative initiative between Food Bank and Stansted Airport under which items surrendered during pre-flight baggage checks are now donated, with passengers' agreement, to Food Bank. During the pilot (*sorry for the pun!*) project, top range goods from Buckingham Palace, Fortnum and Mason, Highgrove and Harrods were collected. Once delivered to the Food Bank, all of these donations are sorted and distributed back into the local community via front-line agencies such as Citizens Advice, children's centres and homeless projects. This valuable addition to the resources available to Food Bank started when Frank Field MP asking all airports in the UK to look at the possibility of supporting their local communities in this way.

As always, thank you to everybody who continues to support this important charity. Your kindness in donating to Food Bank is essential to helping people to become self-sufficient once again. 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Westminster Terrorist Incident - 23 March 2017

Ladies & Gentlemen,

I have been asked to circulate the below statement from Essex Police Assistant Chief Constable, Andy Prophet. Please bear his comments in mind particularly his request for the public to be alert but not alarmed.

Acting Assistant Chief Constable Andy Prophet said:

"On behalf of Essex Police I want to offer the thoughts and prayers of the entire force to members of the public killed, injured or affected by the incident in London today. We of course also join our colleagues in the Metropolitan Police Service in grief for the loss of a serving officer.

This has been declared a terrorist incident in London and is being investigated by the Metropolitan Police Counter Terrorism Command.

In Essex tonight, and until further notice, there will be increased visible police patrol including additional armed officers and other specialist resources.

I urge the public to be alert but not alarmed. Police forces and our partners are doing everything we can to help protect the security of our citizens, public institutions, critical national infrastructure, and businesses and places.

This is a time for communities in Essex to remain resilient, compassionate and supportive of each other. Should anyone have any concerns or see anything suspicious I would urge them to report it immediately by calling 101 or 999 in an emergency."

Fyfield Walks – Norton Mandeville Loop

We are blessed with a fine network of public rights of way in Fyfield and bordering parishes. Over the coming issues of the Fyfield Focus I will share my favourite walks. If you have a walk you would like to share please do send it to me (leslamb@hotmail.co.uk).

Walk Description

4.5 miles of mainly grassy track taking around 2.5 hours at a gentle pace. The route is fine for children and dogs but can get a little muddy down by the river after rain. No facilities on-route but of course we have two great pubs to enjoy when you get back and plenty of places for a picnic on-route. It's not all well signposted so please do print and take the map with you or buy the Ordnance Explorer Map #183. The route follows public footpaths and a short single concrete track between West Park Lodge and East Park Lodge.

Route

The walk starts at the Fyfield Village Hall (1) and goes south along the Three Forests Way. Cross the open field towards Herons Lane then turn left onto the bridleway towards the River Roding and Tun-Bridge (2). Don't cross the bridge but instead turn right along the Essex Way keeping the River Roding on your left (3).

Follow the riverside track for approximately a mile then cross the bridge over the river leading to West Park Lodge (4). Don't miss this bridge or you will end up in Ongar! After a gentle climb up a grassy track turn left and walk on the concrete track towards East Park Lodge (5). After about half a mile turn left at the lodge along the track until you reach the old concrete apron which was

once part of the WW2 Chipping Ongar Airdrome (6).

Follow the straight track north then bear left before the gate which leads to the private shooting grounds (7). At the bottom of the track follow the sign and turn right through the wooded area (8) and then left onto the bridleway towards the Tun-Bridge. Don't cross the bridge but follow the track right across the open field and through the woods (9). You will then come out on the Willingale Road by the church (10). Turn left and cross over the road bridge then take the footpath on the left back to the village hall.

Special points of interest


Keep an eye open for kingfishers and herons along the river. In the river there are very large crayfish and good size fish (I think chub) on the deeper bends. At position 6 there is an old underground train next to the big barn!

I can recommend printing and taking a copy of the map of the airfield ([link below](#)). The map shows the runways, bomb stores, hangers, fuel stores and many other building which catered for over 2000 American service personal and squadrons of B26 bombers in 1944. Still standing is the Radar Workshop in the middle of the field off to your right between (6) and (7). <http://www.americanairmuseum.com/media/17554>



Crime Awareness - Rural Communities eMail Family



Many residents living in the Epping Forest District reside in rural locations where, perhaps, neighbourhood watch is not a viable option. For these residents it is difficult to keep in touch

with what is going on around them in the way of criminal activity. Knowledge is power and if you know the current crime trends it is much easier to address the safety of your own property.

However, if there is no Neighbourhood Watch in your area and to start one wouldn't be practical, there is an alternative. I manage an email group which is called the Rural Communities Email Family. There are currently around 200 members who receive regular updates from me regarding suspicious activity in our rural areas.

ters over the past year. That, of course means that we have yet another vacancy on the Parish Council and details of how to apply and how to request an election are on the Parish Council Notice Board and Web Site. If there is more than one applicant and at least ten residents request an election then an election will take place. If an election is not triggered then the co-option process, where the existing councillors vote on applicants, takes place.

At the March council meeting, the subject of Neighbourhood Watch was raised and it was agreed that Cllr. Les Lamb would start to investigate the desire of the residents to implement a Neighbourhood Watch scheme. If you would like to get involved please contact Les directly. We were all pleased to see Cllr. Tony Boyce our District Councillor in attendance and look forward to him engaging even more in the future.

A few weeks ago, Skippers, the company engaged by the council to maintain the sports field, cleared out the overgrown land behind the garages on the south side of Walker Avenue. This was leased from EFDC about 15 years ago with the

This would be inexpensive to set up and would help to keep the area tidy. Anyone wishing to play could use the facility and maybe complete the game with a drink at the new bar at the Village Hall. 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
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Frothy Extracts From The Pale Ale Annual Of Allegations And Legends.....

Love from Boy

Roald Dahl

This is a book composed of letters from Roald Dahl to his mother Sophie. They span a forty year period starting in 1925, as he started in boarding school, ending in 1965 two years before his mother's death. It was not until just after her death, when he was handed the bundle of letters that he found out that, unbeknown to him, she had kept every one.

Roald was sent to boarding school after his mother took him away from school following a beating by his headmaster.

This move did not seem to be much better for him.

The first letter, under the censorious eye of his headmaster, he wrote:

"Dear Mama, I am having a lovely time here. We are playing football every day. The beds have no springs.....The masters are very nice.....will you send my stamp album. Love Boy."

Although Roald did not start writing his famous children's books until he was aged forty two, his early formative years were when he began practicing his writing skills. The letters were an amazing record of all his frustrations, adventures, whacky and often crude comments, often making light of the more serious events so as not to worry his mother. He would also exaggerate or bend the truth to make his storytelling more interesting. It was during this time he was incubating ideas for future children's stories.

Prep school was followed by public school. On leaving school Roald spent some time working in Tanganika for the Asiatic Petroleum Company, where he records colonial life. On the outbreak of war Roald trained as a fighter pilot in the RAF and loved flying over Africa. Vivid flying imageries were to appear later in 'James and the Giant Peach' and 'The Minpins'.

In 1940 Roald was nearly killed in a plane crash in the Libyan Desert, leaving him with severe injuries including to his head. He made light of his injuries to his mother, but recovery took months. This episode ended his days as a fighter pilot and he did not fancy the idea of becoming an earth bound instructor.

A change in direction came in 1942 when he was offered a job in America working as an assistant air attaché at the British Embassy. Here he mingled with a very different crowd; from the Roosevelts in Washington to Charlie Chaplin and Walt Disney in Hollywood.

The book tells of a very different side with his personal life which involved quite a bit of tragedy. Loss of a father and sister at an early age followed in later life with a young son involved in an accident and the sad loss of a daughter aged seven. Roald's first wife, the actress Patricia Neal, suffered a serious stroke from which he helped her to recover.

All members of our book club thought this book an interesting read, showing us how the complicated life of Roald Dahl helped shape the man and his stories of our much loved books.

As it's Easter this month's cookery column features two very easy but delicious chocolate desserts. Give them a try and let me know what you think.

Chocolate Fondants

100g chocolate
100g butter
2 egg yolks
75g caster sugar
30g rice flour

Preheat the oven to 180c. Melt chocolate & butter in a bowl over a bain marie (bowl in a saucepan of warm water on the hob). Whilst chocolate & butter are melting mix the eggs & sugar. Make sure the chocolate is not too hot and add to the sugar & egg mix. Stir & fold in the flour. Pour the mix into 4 greased fondant moulds (each mould should have 80g batter & you can use ramekins also). Cook in the oven for 8 mins. Check the fondants are cooked but still have a soft centre by carefully removing them from the oven and giving them a shake. If the centre wobbles place it back in the oven for 30 seconds to a minute. You want a soft and oozy middle so be careful to watch the clock. As a final touch, lightly sprinkle the plate with a hint of cocoa powder. Serve warm with a dollop of good quality Italian vanilla ice cream or cream.

(Marie is a very special friend who is half Italian and is a very busy lady juggling lots of balls so this is a perfect dessert to impress but

takes very little time. Its Italian name is Tortino Al Cioccolato Con Cuore Fondente.)

Chocolate Bombe

¾ pint double cream
1oz caster sugar
Grated chocolate
Chocolate mix filling:
6oz plain chocolate
1oz butter
6 egg yolks
6 egg whites

Use a 3pint pudding basin (do not use a smaller bowl).

Lightly whip the cream with sugar and once mixed using the back of a tablespoon, spread the cream evenly to line the inside of the basin and put in the freezer to set firm while preparing the filling.

Break the chocolate into a basin, set over a saucepan half filled with hot, not boiling water. Add the butter and stir occasionally until the chocolate has melted. Add the egg yolks to the chocolate mixture, stir to blend and remove from the heat. Beat the egg whites until they are stiff and form peaks and with a metal spoon fold gently but evenly into the mixture to make a chocolate mousse filling. Pour into the cream lined basin and put back in the freezer and leave overnight or until mixture is frozen hard. About 2 hours before serving unmould the pudding – dip basin up to rim in cold water to take the chill off and slip a palette knife down the inside of the basin to loosen it and turn out on to a serving plate. Place in fridge until ready to serve and before serving sprinkle the grated chocolate over the surface of the bombe.




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FYFIELD, ONGAR & DISTRICT BRIDGE CLUB

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
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Suddenly it's Spring
