Mobile Mast Update

At long last Fyfield will benefit from a strong and reliable mobile phone signal.

Telefonica will be erecting a 25 metre mobile phone mast on White Chicks Farm in the near future enabling O2 and Vodafone customers a strong 3G and 4G signal and with potential for hosting future technological advances. There are also a number of MVNO (Mobile Virtual Network Operators) like Tesco, Sky, Giffgaff and TalkTalk who piggyback on these two national networks and will also provide the service to their customers.

Norwood End Misery

Residents of Norwood End are having to put up with trial bikes and 4x4 vehicles speeding down the By Ways that lead out of Norwood End. As the By Ways are classed as roads it is perfectly legal for them to be used by any vehicle but the residents are worried that the speed limits are not being observed and that there is potential for serious accidents to occur. Essex Highways Department can do nothing about the problem but advise residents to report any issues to the Police using the 101 telephone service.

Letter from the Reverend Christine Hawkins



I wonder if you watched the BBC drama 'Broken' recently? It is a six-part drama, written by Jimmy McGovern and set in the north of England. Sean Bean stars as a Roman

Catholic Priest, Father Michael Kerrigan, who in every fibre of his being is a fantastically good priest. He believes in the power of prayer but also in the power of practical effort; turning up at the doors of his poverty-stricken parishioners not only to offer spiritual support, but also food vouchers.

Sean Bean portrays the life of a priest with honesty and accuracy. Fr. Kerrigan is sometimes just an 'ordinary Joe' when he is in the pub with his brothers or in bed alongside his dying mother, holding her hand through the night; but at other times he is definitely the Parish Priest – someone who is meant to have all the answers; to come up with the goods every time in his parishioners' hour of need; someone to whom his community looks for stability, hope, instruction and support, but who is never meant to ask for those things for himself. He is a man who seems to be known and respected as a priest; someone who is significant in the lives of his parishioners.

The series is causing me to reflect on my own priesthood, my own ministry here amongst the good folk of Bobbingworth, Fyfield, Moreton and Willingale. We live in a privileged part of our country, the polar opposite of Father Kerrigan's parish, yet I know there are some people who are struggling, daily, in many different ways. Ours is not an area where poverty is obvious, yet I suspect there is hidden poverty in every one of our villages. My task, the task I accepted, joyfully, when I was appointed here is to hear the cry of your hearts and to serve you all.

The Church of England differs from the Roman Catholic Church because we are the national church of our country and Anglican priests are meant to minister to the whole community, whether people have a Christian faith or not. I am not saying here that RC priests do not minister to anyone other than their faithful parishioners, as many of them do, but the call to Anglican ministry is distinctive – it is to *everyone* in the parish.

How can I, effectively, be a priest to all of you and to the people of Lavers and Matching Benefice when they come under my care at the end of July? I am fortunate to have the Reverend Albert Watson and his wife Pam in my team – I don't know how I would manage without them – and we hope to recruit a further team member, a priest who will live in the Lavers Rectory, later this year. Yet the question remains – how can we serve you? How can we be a 'presence' in each community so that each one of you

feels that you know your priest as someone who can accompany you in good times and in bad; someone who is knitted to the fabric of village life in a meaningful way and who also is the bearer of Christian hope for all of you?

I aspire to be the kind of priest that Father Kerrigan is, someone who is above everything else, faithful to God but who is also known and trusted in his community. I do not want to be a remote figure - one who can only be found via an answering machine in The Rectory, but I need to discover ways in which I can become more accessible to all of vou. Please bear with me as I continue to develop links with you. I know - have heard – that some of you have commented that you do not see me and do not know me. It is my sincere hope that, in time, many of you will know me and the other members of my team and

will feel able to come to us to share your struggles as well as your joys, but also to seek to know more about God; the God who inspired me, Rev Albert and Fr. Kerrigan to answer a call to the ministry of a priest in God's church; the God who loves each one of us exactly as we are.

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Dear Dog Walkers of Fyfield,

This letter is a simple and polite request to ask dog walkers to show consideration for others whilst exercising their pets on the sports field.

I myself am a dog walker and walk my dogs every day, but I always keep them on the lead on the sports field. They are only allowed off the lead on the fields beyond and only if it safe to do so. I am mindful that not everyone shares my love of dogs and do not appreciate them running loose, jumping up and generally being a nuisance. The sports field is used by families with young children and elderly residents both of which could be seriously hurt if knocked over, even by the friendliest of dogs! Just this week an elderly neighbour was walking her dog on the sports field, on the lead, and was rushed at by a large loose dog which caused her dog to jolt her so violently she has seriously injured her neck and shoulder.

Another issue is the dogs mess! I have witnessed on numerous occasions, loose dogs going to the toilet on the field and the owners are paying so little attention to what their dog is doing that they don't know where they have been and, therefore, do not clear it up!

I personally, and I know other residents share my view, think that there should be a "dogs on leads only" on the sports field rule in place, and think that this is an issue that the parish council should look at. However, while this is not in place, please dog walkers, it's not hard, show a bit of respect and consideration for other residents and our village sports field.

Church Spire and Roof



The repairs to the spire and roof of your village church are now complete; the scaffolding gone and the site (almost) cleared. Nobody passing the church can fail to spot the glorious golden shingles now covering the spire. Oh, yes; and the clock is back telling the correct time. Now is the time to say "Thank you" to the various people who have made this possible.

When I became churchwarden nearly three decades ago, one of my first challenges was to learn precisely where to place each of the many buckets which caught the water coming through the roof of this 900 years old building. The church was in an advanced state of dilapidation; water coming through the roof, broken windows and heating so dangerous we simply used portable gas heaters. The lighting was inadequate and was run through sixty-yearsold cloth-covered wiring and the drainage system for water coming off the roof had given up years before, leaving the surrounding ground waterlogged. Daunting does not describe how I regarded the list of problems.

One day in 2002 I was invited to a meeting at Laurie King's home. I arrived to find a group of residents who made me an offer. If I would coordinate all the repairs necessary to restore our parish church, they would undertake to find the considerable funds the work would need. This was the inaugural meeting of the Friends of St

Nicholas' Church. So thanks, first, to Laurie King, finance expert, who took the problem of raising the money by the scruff of its neck and got funds moving our way. The other founder members owed thanks are Alan Cook, Annette King, Paul Gilbert, Mary Ellis, Peter and Carol Gabriel and Paul Green. If I have omitted anybody, I apologise.

Through the intervening years, we have repaired and insulated the nave roof, reroofed the north aisle and the organ chamber and then the south aisle. We rebuilt the battlements, installed new soakaways, rebuilt guttering, rewired the entire building and fitted low-energy lighting. Next we installed up-to-date central heating and fitted security lighting. Once we were satisfied that the building was weathertight, we redecorated throughout. Problems along the way included thieves stealing the new lead from the roof of the north aisle. They came back for it night after night but by their third attempt, we had managed to install a roof alarm and that problem was resolved - until recently. Another emergency was the discovery of asbestos in the organ chamber. Once again, the Friends came up with the funds and within days we had removed the asbestos, with the added bonus that we gained a more powerful blower for the organ. Along the way, we repaired brickwork and buttresses and the timbers in the belfry – at the same time arranging for all our timbers to be dendrochronologically dated. Following a burglary and, later, some petty theft, we installed CCTV. Finally, we were left with just the spire, the chancel roof and the roof of the porch to repair and now even those jobs have been completed. Grateful thanks are due again to the Friends for the money they contributed and especially to Julie

Robinson for her unstinting work in securing the enormous grant we needed for this final push. It is appropriate also to thank the builder, Caters and the architect, David Fergusson, who did everything possible to make sure the job was completed on schedule and on budget. Thanks also to Alan Cook, who took the opportunity of the refurbishment of the louvred section of the spire to install Swift boxes.

During this last project, we have been plagued with thieves trying again to steal the lead from the roof. My thanks go to Chris Hayes (Small Works) who turned out for me one night at 2am to get me up on the roof to remove the tape they had put on the alarm sensors. My thanks also to the Bishop and Archdeacon for giving emergency permission for additional security measures without the bureaucracy of a faculty application.

Throughout all these jobs so many others have contributed to make the restoration possible. I cannot name everybody but must mention the members of the Parochial Church Council and, especially, the everdependable Carol Cox, who works tirelessly for the wellbeing of her church. Thanks also to Wendy Henshaw, who so kindly took on the church finances. Neither of them ever lets us down.

Finally, let me thank all the other villagers who quietly support their village church. You know who you are and I am grateful to you all beyond words. It is inevitable that a church of this age will need future maintenance and repairs but I am pleased to confirm that the project started all those years ago to address the long-term dilapidations is complete and your village

church has no major problems left to address.

A Brief Appreciation

Helen Simpson lived in the centre of Fyfield Village for many years, having

moved here from the Midlands with her husband, Brian, in the late 1980s. They soon became well-known and loved members of the local community. Sadly, after a long period of failing health, Helen died in Princess Alexandra Hospital on 13th June, in her 87th year. Helen's family are planning a Celebration of her life on Fridav13th October at St Nicholas' Church and at the Village Hall. Wednesday 28th June,

some of Helen's closest friends arranged an impromptu gathering at St Nicholas' Church at 9.0am, the time of her cremation.

The Rev. Christine Hawkins was asked for her help and she led the forty or so people present, providing them with the opportunity to say their Goodbyes to a dear friend and neighbour in a loving and peaceful atmosphere. Christine invited everyone to share their memories of Helen over the years and many did so, speaking of her friendship and her commitment to

village life. We are all grateful to Christine Hawkins for her swift and sympathetic response to a communal need to express our love and grief over the loss of a very good friend and neighbour. Helen had herself

experienced the grief of bereavement, losing her husband. Brian. cancer in 1999 and just a few years earlier their two-vear old granddaughter died from leukaemia.

Helen was an extremely capable and wellorganised person; she had worked in local government and as a GP Practice Manager, and her energy and talents were put to good use in Fyfield. After joining the WI. Helen served as Secretary on

Committee for 23 years, retiring only a year ago, and was always a loyal and enthusiastic member. In the wider community. Helen and her friend and neighbour, Rita Barnard, ran a weekly social club for senior citizens, based at Frank Bretton House in Ongar, for over 16 years. Helen also helped organise Village Hall fund-raising activities and was a very good neighbour.

We will all miss her very much.

New Service Launched to Help Maintain Loved One's Final Resting Place

A new service has been launched in the area caring for graves on behalf of relatives who are unable to do this themselves, either through distance or infirmity.

Judith Farr, who until the end of January worked for Ongar Town Council, will visit and tend graves for relatives and deliver fresh flowers.

Judith said "When I was working for the council relatives often used to ask me if staff could look after graves for them. Unfortunately this was not something the council was able to do and so I thought I would offer this service myself. The cemetery is always something I have felt passionately about. I enjoy working with people and have empathy with the relatives. It is one of those times when you need people to be helpful and sympathetic and having someone they can talk to makes a huge difference."

Services offered include maintenance around the headstone and edge of plots, the washing of memorials, memorial inspections, the delivery of freshly cut flowers as well as help with grave tracing and photographs for genealogists. Judith will visit cemeteries in Epping Forest District, Harlow, Chelmsford and Uttlesford.

She added "Summer is now here and this is the time of year when vegetation is growing fast. Regular care and attention can make a big difference when caring for graves and keep them in the best possible condition."

Her experience with cemetery records was highlighted in the BBC programme Family Finders where she reunited members of a family, where one lived in Hertfordshire and the other relative lived in Australia, who had a relative buried in Ongar Cemetery, Love Lane.

Working with her husband, Judith has set up D & J Cemetery Care which offers a bespoke service tailored to client's individual requirements.

Fyfield has officially joined the national NhW scheme and we now have good contacts with the organisation concerned with our region.

Being a member of the

NhW family is already starting to provide benefits. We now receive and share crime updates which have included information on burglaries, antisocial behaviour and thefts that have occurred close to our parish. Along with advice on how to prevent and report crime, such as the incidents of dangerous and antisocial behaviour (see below for details).

Over the next few weeks we will be placing NhW signs on the routes into Fyfield and find ways to distribute the printed materials available to us.

There are two ways to receive NhW updates electronically.

- 1) Join the members' only Facebook group. You will firstly need a Facebook account which is free and easy to setup. Then search for FyfieldGrapevine and click the option to request membership. Updates will be posted onto the FyfieldGrapevine page which you will then see.
- 2) If you would prefer to receive updates via e-mail then send an e-mail message to fyfieldgrapevine@hotmail.com with your name. Your e-mail address will be added to a secure distribution list and you will receive the updates in an e-mail. Your address will not be shared or used for any other purpose other than NhW.

Without an active membership the scheme will fail. So please do join in, it will cost you nothing. The intention of NhW is to raise awareness, not to scare, and we are informed by successful NhW groups that it can bring a community closer together.

Antisocial Behaviour in Norwood End

Residents of Norwood End have reported that some motorcyclists are riding dangerously on the narrow byways that run from Blackcat down to the village. The advice received from regional NhW and Essex Highways is to report incidents to the police on their 101 non-emergency number. Good afternoon.

It's lovely to see so many family and friends of my mother in church. I know she would be touched. We are here to celebrate and give thanks for her long and full life.

Where should I start? My mother lived life to the full - for 97 years! Perhaps I should start with her early vears. She was born in Northumberland. the youngest of six. She was a quick scholar and loved school. At the age of 18 she came to London, showing remarkable bravery as she knew nobody there. In a short while she joined the BBC as one of the first women engineers, contributing to vital war work on the transmittors. It was a job she loved, being a pioneer, and of which she was very proud all her life. Her story is to be found in the BBC Archives. She

my father moved to South Woodford. She worked in Walthamstow for a few years and as well as being a classroom teacher ran a highly successful netball team at Roger Ascham School. This team became known as the Acham's Bash - ems and my mother, with typical resourcefulness, transported the team (7 players) plus 2 reserves, in her Morris

Traveller! I wouldn't think you could do exactly the same now!

was ideal - a field
for a horse for us
to ride, a small
orchard and a
large garden. I
have a vivid
memory of my
mother flying
round on the siton mower, cutting
the grass at top
speed and ducking to

avoid low branches of

the apple trees. She was nearly always successful......

Mum was always involved in the local community. She was a teacher at Ongar Junior School and many pupils remember the exciting trips she ran, including plane trips from Stansted. My mother seemed to know everyone in Ongar - a brief (we thought) shopping trip there could take, it seemed, forever, as there were frequent cries of "Barbara!" or "Mrs Sutton!" (from former pupils). Long conversations ensued.

My mother certainly knew everyone in Fyfield. The list of her interests and activities is impressive and I am sure I have left some out. She was Secretary of the PPC here at St Nicholas, a keen member of the WI, on the Parish Council, Chairman of the School Governors at Dr Walker's School and also ran a French conversation class for adults at Quinneys. My mother loved having the house full of people, particularly at Christmas. The Handbell Ringers used to come and we all enjoyed mince pies and mulled wine. Some of us even got the chance to try out the bells!

Now I would like to talk about the family, whom Mum/Grandma adored. Mike and I treasure the memory of her loving and caring for our twins, Katie and Chris, who arrived on Christmas Eve 1983! Quite a Christmas present! My mother of course took it all in her stride. Looking back, this must have been a particularly difficult time for her as my father had died only four months before. When Becca was born, nearly 3 years later, it was exactly the same - a new gandchild to love. Our children relished being with her and she with them. She was always fun to be with - laughing, telling them stories and playing with them. A highlight of the year when they were very young was staying with her for a week at the Everslev Hotel in Ventnor on the Isle of Wight. There were days on the beach, bus trips round the whole island, Blackgang Chine and of course a grown up dinner for all in the evening (no question of an early tea for children they took all the courses!) They returned for several years. In 2009 there was some role reversal. Katie.

Chris and Becca took my mother to the same hotel and revisited their old haunts. Two years later they took Mum to the Savoy for tea where all enjoyed scones and cake!

I'm trying to show briefly how much my mother was loved as a wife, mother, grandmother and friend. She was enthusiastic about everything, sociable and always interested in people. Her determination kept her going for 97 years. At times she didn't hesitate to speak her mind and was respected for it.

To finish, I would like to leave you with some words my mother spoke to me a while ago.

"When I'm gone," she said thoughtfully and paused. I waited, hoping for some wisdom I could impart to the family. Not so. "When I'm gone, make sure you all have a good party to remember me!" That's what we're going to do!

Fyfield W.I. are saddened by the loss of our former secretary for 23 years Helen Simpson who passed away on 13th June. Helen had suffered from pain for a long time and although we miss her very much at least she is now free from pain.

Several of us went to church on Wednesday 28th June when Helen was being cremated to say our goodbyes. Sadly in May a former W.I. member Barbara Sutton died, Barbara was our press secretary for many years and wrote excellent press reports for us.

At our June meeting our speaker Linda Ketteridge gave a fascinating history of Audley End House. It remained in the same family since Henry VIII gave it to Thomas Audley, a lawyer who was one of the signatories on Anne Boleyn's death warrant. Thomas had no sons so the house was left to his daughter who married the 4th Duke of Norfolk. Unfortunately she died at the early age of 24 and an Uncle brought up her sons as Protestants. He commanded 'The Golden lion' in the battle against the Spanish Armada and was knighted by Elizabeth I.

Thomas Howard was made 1st Earl of Suffolk for allegiance to James I. He was treasurer and was accused of embezzlement, in 1604 he had started to pull down part of the old house in order to build a more prestigious one; but because he was fined £9000 there was no money to complete it. So as it stands today is only a 3rd of the original building. He was disgraced, no friends and future generations left with no money to keep up the repairs. Then Charles II visited the house on his way to the races, this led to drastic measures and the owners sold anything they could to put the house ready to receive royalty.

The 10th Earl of Suffolk married a wealthy brewery heiress so they were able to

entertain again when he died his wife held a country house sale. The Countess of Portsmouth inherited; she was the Granddaughter of the Earl of Suffolk, her nephew Sir John Griffin then inherited. He employed Capability Brown to design the gardens, there is a beautiful specimen of a Cedar of Lebanon planted in 1787, Robert Adam – interior decorator of the day – just did the ground floor, which is painted green. 1st Lord Braybrook had no children so the house went to a cousin, 3rd Lord Braybrook had eight children.

But the house was left to English Heritage and finally bought in 1948 by the Government to manage.

At the July meeting Maggie Piper, a W.I. member for West Hanningfield, came and spoke to us about National Memorial Arboratum, which is in Staffordshire. She showed us pictures of some of the 300 memorials that are in the Arboratum, most of the wood carvings were done by the Essex Woodcarvers. Only one of our members had visited and she and Maggie both recommended it as a wonderful place to visit.

We were pleased to welcome Sandra Mead as a new member in May, andwere pleased to welcome two visitors in July and hope they will come and join us.

No meeting in August but next meeting on 7th September when Georgette Vale will demonstrate how to make 3d fabric flowers. On Wednesday 27th September you are invited to come and have your "Just Desserts". We are having a just desserts lunch at £5.00 a dessert or £7.00 for two! Tea or coffee included. From 12.00 until 200.p.m. in Fyfield Village Hall, with a £1 stall and a raffle.

Letter from the Chairman



At the last Parish Council Meeting we discussed the proposal from Telefonica to build a mobile phone mast at White Chicks Farm, Willingale Road, under Permitted Development. Under the terms of

Permitted Development the only obiections can be on the grounds of location or appearance. If no suitable private site can be found for the mast then a site can be imposed such as at the roadside as is the case in most towns. The meeting was attended by a group of residents from the Willingale Road area who obiected to the selected location. The Parish Council did not support their objections as they felt that the need for a reliable mobile phone signal in Fyfield was long overdue and that the chosen site was acceptable. Essex County Councillor, Maggie McEwen agreed to raise the matter at the next EFDC Planning East Committee for discussion by the EFDC committee members. At the EFDC meeting a spokesman for the residents put their case and the committee discussed the issue and decided that the

application to build the mast should be passed.

Nathan's Mum mentioned that Emma Thompson kept giving him lots of cuddles! On the second day on set it was his 10th birthday and the cast made a big fuss of him. Emma Watson, Emma Thompson, Luke Evans and Nathan share the same birthday! Nathan also remembered that the food was 'brilliant' and there was also a sweet stall which you could help yourself to. On the day of the Premiere on 23rd February this year Nathan along with his Mum and Dad were picked up from home at 2pm and driven to Spencer House at St. James's Place, London for the press run which involved 40 camera crews and reporters. The Premiere was held that evening in Leicester Square and was followed by an After Party.

Nathan expressed what a magical experience it has all been and he feels very fortunate. He doesn't talk about the experience in his day to day life. He really enjoys doing interviews as he can re-live the experience and he also enjoys auditions. His advice to anyone his age who goes for auditions is to be very relaxed, have fun and enjoy the experience.

If you don't get the role it's not negative it's just not right for you.

Nathan thinks the Beauty and the Beast is a great film for everyone and the music is very powerful; he particularly likes 'Ever More' which is sung by The Beast. He also expressed that Disney have made this amazing experience even more amazing through their generosity and thoughtfulness throughout and in particular in providing a Private Screening of the film (with cake and balloons) for him and 140 family and friends on his 12th birthday.

Nathan has a very expressive face and is clearly talented and I can imagine most casting directors being impressed by him. What impressed me the most about Nathan is that he is considerate, caring and yet at the same time fun to be with and he has his feet firmly on the ground. I thanked Nathan for agreeing to do the interview and shook his hand and then decided I needed to give him a cuddle; well why not when Emma Thompson can give him lots of cuddles?!

The film DVD was released on 17th July and I agree with Nathan it's a great film, wonderful photography and has something for everyone.

When I say that that was the best part of the evening I really mean it and the audience loved it.



The RSC History Play by Helen Edmundson is about one of our lesser known monarchs Queen Anne (House of

Stuart) who came to the throne in 1702 and reigned for nearly 12 years. Queen Anne was the voungest sister of Mary II and in 1683 married Prince George of Denmark. At the time Anne ascended to the throne there was much political infighting, concerns about continental Europe and the 1707 union of Scotland and Wales. The play focuses on the relationship between Queen Anne (Emma Cunniffe) and Sarah Churchill, Duchess of Marlborough (Romola Garai). Queen Anne is shy, suffers with chronic gout and has had successive miscarriages and is dependent on Sarah's friendship and able council. Sarah is scheming and very ambitious and is not a genuine friend to the Queen and the relationship sours when Sarah overplays her hand and Queen Anne overcomes her shyness and becomes a resolute Oueen. There are musical interludes which primarily poke fun at the Queen and which provide a change of pace. A very informative and enjoyable play with excellent performances, staging and period costumes and received a standing ovation. Worth seeing and is running until 30th September.

Two delicious recipes which are perfect for Summer; a lunch or dinner main course and a very impressive dessert. Both have been made by myself many times.

Griddled Salmon with Tomatoes

6tbsp olive oil
2 tbsp white wine vinegar
8 coriander seeds, lightly crushed
7 oz cherry toms, deseeded & roughly chopped
6 tbsp roughly torn basil leaves
10 oz new potatoes, thinly sliced
1 lb 7 oz salmon fillet, skinned
sunflower or olive oil, for brushing

Serves 6

Put the oil, vinegar & coriander seeds in a small pan and heat briefly to infuse. Toss in the tomatoes and basil, season with salt & pepper and set aside. Cook the sliced potatoes in a pan of boiling salted water for about 5-8 mins until just tender. Put the salmon on a chopping board and cut at an angle into ½ inch thick slices. Season with salt & pepper. Brush a griddle or large fying pan with oil and heat until very hot. Fry the salmon for about 20 seconds on each side until just cooked; keep warm. Drain the potatoes and arrange on 6 plates. Top

each serving with 2 salmon slices. Gently warm the sauce and drizzle it over and around the salmon and potatoes. Serve at once.

A Terrine of Summer Fruits

15 fl oz sparkling rose wine
11g gelatine granules
2 oz caster sugar
1 tbsp fresh lime juice
12 ox small strawberries
8 oz raspberries
4 oz each of blackcurrants,
Blueberries, redcurrants (or any other combination you like)
Serves 8

You will need 2 x 2 lb loaf tins (7 1/2 x 4 3/4 inch x 3 1/2 inch deep) Preferably non-stick Prepare the fruit: remove the stalks, & halve the strawberries if they are any larger than a quails egg. Then mix the fruits together in a large bowl, being very gentle so as to avoid bruising them. In a small saucepan heat half the rose wine till it simmers, then whisk the sugar & gelatine into it. Make sure that everything has dissolved completely before adding the remaining wine and the lime juice. Then pour the liquid into a jug and allow it to cool. While that's happening, lay the mixed fruit in the

loaf tin – and it's worth arranging the bottom layer with the smallest prettiest-shaped fruit as this will be on top when the terrine is turned out. Next pour all but 5 fl oz of the liquid over the fruit. Lay a sheet of clingfilm over the tin, place the other tin directly on top, then put two unopened tins of tomatoes or something similar to act as weights into the top tin and put the whole lot into the fridge for about 1 hr or until it has set. Then warm up the remaining 5 fl oz of wine mixture and pour it over the surface of the terrine (it is necessary to add the extra mixture after weighting to save spillage with the weighting required to help with slicing the terrine when being served). Recover with cling film and return to the fridge overnight to set firm. When you are ready to serve, turn out the terrine by dipping the tin very briefly in hot water and inverting it on to a plate. Use a very sharp knife (also dipped first into hot water) to cut it into slices. Serve with chilled pouring cream, crème fraiche or Greek yoghurt.

South Downs Expedition written by Chloe Bellsham


