Silence over Fyfield

Has anyone noticed that there are not as many aircraft flying over Fyfield? It seems that many aircraft taking off from Stansted in the south west direction have a new flight path. Until recently, aircraft bound for destinations in the direction of northern France took a route that passed over Fyfield to follow the Detling (near Maidstone) air corridor out over the English Channel to France. That has now been changed and aircraft now fly on a route that takes them in the direction of Clacton, not Fyfield. There are still a few aircraft that pass over us but far fewer than before.

Fyfield Focus wins Magazine Award

The Fyfield Focus has won a merit award at the annual Essex Life Community Magazine Awards competition organised by the RCCE with backing from Essex Life, the Diocese of Chelmsford and Newport News. The winners received their awards at a reception held at The West Street Vineyard in Coggeshall on the 20th July. The RCCE competition is designed exclusively for magazines edited and put together by volunteers and this year attracted more than 40 entries.

Mobile Signal Soon!

Fyfield looks like it is very close to getting a good mobile phone signal as Telefonica are planning to erect a 15m high communications pole on Lower Houchin Field near the large oak tree. Other sites were considered but the selected site met all requirements. With any luck Fyfield will have passed from a no signal area to a fully serviced area with the fastest broadband in the country plus a 4G ready mobile phone signal.

Support the Shop

Fyfield is in the very fortunate position of having its own Village Shop and Post Office but we should not take this for granted. Like pubs, village shops and post offices are closing down all over the country and it's true, you never know what you've got until you lose it. The only way to keep our shop is to support it by buying goods from there. We really do need to start doing more of this now. If you already support the shop then that's fine but we can all do more. The next time you are in the shop just consider where you would have to go if it was no longer in business.

Ongar Research Station - Developing a Weed Killer

When I'm walking our dog around the footpaths and look out over the fields of cereal crops it reminds me of my time working at the Ongar Research Station for May and Baker. My job in Agrochemical Research was to help find and develop new cereal crop weed killers and in 1979 we discovered a selective weed killer that went on to be a market leader.

We tested thousands of chemicals each year to see if they killed weeds but did not harm crops. Very occasionally one would show promising signs but often development was subsequently dropped for various reasons. However, in November 1979 we assessed the previous week's experiments and it was a remarkable result. The broadleaf weeds had turned white but the cereal crops were totally unharmed and within a few days the weeds had died. It was incredibly effective on many broad leaved weeds and killed them at just a few grams per hectare.

Our reference number for the chemical was M&B38544 and its' chemical name was Diflufenican. These terms were to become part of our everyday language and it was the start of years of laboratory tests and field trials all over the country.

Part of my job was to set-up small scale field trials to assess how the chemical was affected by soil type and weather conditions. Also back in the laboratory to measure how quickly it was metabolised and passed through the soil. The trials were UK wide

but many were around the Ongar and Fyfield area and involved the co-operation of lots of our local farmers.

As M&B38544 passed the numerous tests we became ever more hopeful that this time we had a product that would make it to market. Finally, in the late 80's it did. Under the brand name "Javelin" it quickly became a market leader and I believe it is still in use today under different names and combinations with other chemicals.

Weeds seem to appear daily in my garden but thanks to discoveries like Diflufenican there is often not a single weed peeking above a huge field of crops.

I went onto work in I.T. at the M&B site in Dagenham but look fondly back to my 18 years at Ongar Research Station. I am proud to have been part of such a small but successful research team and even better to have met my future wife, Kate, who worked there in finance.

In July several of our old May and Baker colleagues are coming to a reunion. Kate and I can't wait to catch up with them and reminisce about old times.

It would be great to hear from local farmers who remember working with me and other colleagues at May and Baker all those years ago.

Winners of the 100 club for July were 86, 21 and 8. If you want to join, you can still do so by paying pro rata by contacting Marie Apperley on 899386.



Garden gnomes, you either love them or hate them but if it is not a gnome, I am sure you have some other objet d'art in your garden

whether it be a statue amongst the greenery or a fancy wind chime. Me, I like unusual containers, the rustier the merrier but each to their own. I have been to the Gibberd Garden at Harlow, renowned for its abstract exhibits but, in truth, they left me cold and uninspired but my interest was awakened on a recent Gardening Club visit to Barnards Farm, a private garden on the A128 a mile past the Halfway House, opened under the National Gardens Scheme.

The garden covers 17 hectares and its more parkland carved out of woods aka Capability Brown than Gertrude Jekyll herbaceous borders although there is plenty of colour surrounding the house and café. The main stay of this garden is the 80 sculptures punctuating the landscape. There is plenty to amuse and enjoy like the oversized silver rhino or the outdoor bathing boy but my green-eyed monster came out when I saw this giant verdigris creature. Particu-

larly stunning are the four sentinels soaring aloft and a larger than life angel just about to take off from a lawn. All sculptures are of gallery quality and if only I could afford just one something similar....

containers. Annuals like sweet peas and runner beans have struggled with the lack of sunshine and what little growth has emerged has been munched to nothing. I feel that I




have been visited by some of the plagues of Egypt and wonder what next.

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


St Nicholas' Church – A St. Nicholas Tapestry

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Cookery Section



This month we feature two more Summer recipes which are both light and refreshing and perfect for Summer, although both recipes can be enjoyed at other times of the year too. Last month we featured a Fig, Lardon & Dolcelatte Tart and a starter of Aubergine, Tomatoes, Basil & Mozzarella (Melanzane alla parmigiana). The tart recipe contained an error in the list of ingredients for the tart filling – 2 fl oz mild should have read 2fl oz milk! Thank you to Mary Simons for bringing this to our attention. Next month's recipes will feature some lovely recipes for Autumn – a main course and a starter – and I can't wait to share them with you.

Peaches Baked in Marsala with **Mascarpone Cream**

Peaches:

6 firm ripe peaches 11/2 oz caster sugar 10 fl oz sweet marsala wine linch einnamon stick 1 vanilla pod 1 rounded tsp arrowroot

Mascarpone Cream:

4 rounded this mascarpone 4 rounded the fromage fraise – 8% fat A few drops of vanilla extract 1tsp caster sugar Serves 6

Preheat the oven to gas mark 4. Begin by halving the peaches and removing stones, then place the halves in a bowl, pour boiling water over them and, after 30 seconds, drain AND SLIP OFF SKINS. Now place peach halves in a shallow baking dish, mix the sugar & Marsala in a jug and pour over. Add the cinnamon stick and vanilla pod to the dish, then place on the centre shelf of the oven and bake (do not cover the dish) for 35040 mins

Remove from the oven and drain juices into a small saucepan. Mix the arrowroot with a little cold water then add it to the saucepan and whisk over a gentle heat until slightly thickened; this will happen as soon as it reaches simmering point. Then pour the juice back over the peaches and leave to cool. To make the mascarpone cream beat all the ingredients together and pile high into a pretty serving dish to hand round separately.

(This is a lovely Summer fruit dessert which my friend Lynne Evans gave me many years ago and you feel you are eating a naughty dessert when you aren't. If you are doing a dinner party and want to offer a choice of two desserts this is a good alternative to go with a more calorie laden dessert. You must use good quality *ripe peaches (or nectarines) – not the ones* which taste like cotton wool!)

Grilled (or fried) Chicken with Chilli, Lemon & Mint

400g chicken off the bone (breast, thigh meat, whatever)

1 med sized hot red chilli (or 2 bird's eye red chillies), seeded & chopped 1heaped tsp crushed dried chillies 2 cloves of garlic, peeled & chopped 2 pinches of saffron stamens A handful of mint leaves (20 or so) 4tbl spns olive oil Juice of large or 2 small lemons Hunks of lemon, to serve

Serves 2

Cut the chicken into thin strips roughly the size of a finger and put them in a basin. Whizz the fresh and dried chillies, the garlic, saffron, most of the mint, olive oil and most of the lemon juice in a blender or food processor till you have a thick, speckled, bright red, orange and green slush. Pour it over the chicken and toss gently. Set aside for half an hour for the chicken to take up some of the flavours of the marinade. Heat a ridged grill pan and

lightly oil it. When it is hot, add the strips of chicken, and any marinade clinging to them, and fry for three or four mins on each side, till they are golden brown in patches but cooked through. They will be firm to the touch and sticky. Watch that the chilli does not burn; it if shows any sign of singeing, then turn down the heat. Season with a little salt and the remaining lemon juice and mint. Serve with hunks of lemon.

(This is another recipe from my friend Lynne Evans who introduced me to this Cook/Chef and like all the recipes Lynne recommends they are full of flavour. This dish is good for everyday eating or for a casual supper dish with friends and I serve with simple vegetables or salad & salad potatoes. You will need to experiment with the amount of chillies depending on the level of heat you like. I always marinade for longer than 30 mins and always use thigh meat. I quite often do four times the recipe and after marinating overnight *freeze in portions of two.)*

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Light Hearted Monologues from a Local

An Abridged Tale of High Jinx and Suspense

One cloudless morning as traffic crossed over San Francisco Bay the following were inexorably linked:

The Golden Gate Bridge, Dodge trucks, Charly "yo yo" Jackson and Sam Hill.

On 27th May, 1937 the suspension bridge was completed and opened spanning the Golden Gate strait. Spectacularly his "Holds Em Up" brand of trouser braces snagged onto a rivet

as he descended at some speed from above the bridge. At the lowest stretch of the elastic Mr Jackson started his ascent and encountered the



top of the bridge with his head. Quickly scrabbling at anything he could grab a scaffold board came into his grip as he began to rush downwards again. As the law of gravity dictates his descent increased with the added weight. Reaching the extent that the stretched elastic would allow the upward movement began only to be stopped by Charly's head again. Alarmingly the buttons holding one side of his braces flew off of his trousers as he, unable to stop, began to approach Mother Earth again. WAMDRAMS performance of 'DUETS' – by Peter Quilter

Friday, 10th June, Willingale Village Hall

Under the skilful direction of John Jewiss and Allyson McKenna, the six strong cast gave their audience an enjoyable evening with their performance of 'Duets' – a trio of three short plays that deal with the dilemmas, joys, frustrations and romanticism (or lack of it) involved in male/female relationships, as portrayed in three very different couples. Peter Quilter is a West End and Broadway playwright whose plays have been translated into over 20 languages and performed in more than 40 countries. I had never seen any of his work before, but discovered that he is an Essex man - born in Colchester. In 'Duets' he explores the strengths, frailties and eccentricities of his characters through the comedy, misunderstandings, memories, hopes and doubts that their different situations produce.

In 'Blind Date' middle-aged Jonathan and Wendy (played by Jim Noon and Jo Easter) meet at Jonathan's apartment via a magazine lonely-hearts column. Both have clearly had bad romantic experiences in the past, but are hoping to overcome their nerves, giving us some great comedy moments. Jonathan is uneasy, less than truthful about his age, romantic but rather shy, whereas Wendy's nerves make her a little over eager to please. She voices her dilemma over what to bring when turning up for a pre-dinner drink before going out to dinner on a blind date, 'What can a woman bring as a gift? It's easy for Men

-they can take flowers ... 'so she explains to a bemused Jonathan that she has brought him some cheese! However, we get the feeling that she may win out in the end. Excellent performances from both Jim Noon and Jo Easter.

The characters in 'Holiday' are a married, middle-aged couple, Bobby and Shelley, who have decided to go to Spain for one last fling before getting divorced! ('Holiday was paid for so we might as well have it' says practical Bobby, glumly.) Will the holiday and shared memories change their minds, we wonder? Shelley, determined to party into the small hours, is rapidly drowning in a sea of cocktails, much to Bobby's dismay as he attempts to restrain her drinking! Barry and Margaret Freeman were convincing in their roles and gave us plenty of laughs as well as moments of nostalgia and regret. Finally, in 'The Bride To Be' we meet Angela and her brother Toby, played with great skill by Gemma Crouchman and Steve McFaul. Angela is in a neighbour's flat, in her bridal dress, about to get married for the third time, with brother, Toby, on hand to escort her to the Church. Angela is superstitious, nervous, and seeks endless reassurance from Toby about her dress – a cross between a voluminous white meringue and an unwieldy parachute - and whether she should go ahead with her third marriage. She begs Toby to get her coffee, for her nerves, then spills it down her dress! Toby's patience is almost exhausted before she eventually agrees to go out to the waiting car, but his relief is short-lived! We hear thunder and lightning and Angela enters, dripping hair and running mascara!

Toby reassures and coaxes Angela and we have glimpses of the strong brother/sister bond between them before Angela recovers her confidence sufficiently to go up the aisle again!

All three plays were well executed and very enjoyable. Congratulations to the Directors and the Cast, and to all those backstage workers who designed and created the set, found the props, managed the wardrobe, lighting and sound effects. A great team effort! Finally, I enjoyed the layout of the hall that was informal and relaxed and appreciated having a drink in the extended Bar! Here's to the next one, WAMDRAMS!
