
RAF Fyfield Night Landing Ground



Not many people know this but to combat the Zeppelin and first night bombing raids over London and the south east, the Royal Flying Corps, predecessor to the RAF, set up a number of night

fighter units. Whilst based at key airfields, their work was supported by a large number of Night Landing Grounds which acted as dispersal sites where aircraft could operate from.

39 Squadron was set up to undertake defence duties of London and the surrounding area and for a while was based at North Weald. Supporting this work was a dispersed site just to the south of Fyfield and close to the main road that leads to Ongar (adjacent to Bundish Hall). The 25 acre site had no permanent buildings and was operated



by a small contingent of RFC officers and men. It was opened in early 1917 and was closed in 1919, initially operating Royal Aircraft Factory BE2 aircraft.

The first German Zeppelin to be shot down in the war was over Cuffley in Hertfordshire on the night of 2/3rd September. It was downed by Captain William Leefe Robinson who was based at Suttons Farm airfield later to become RAF Hornchurch which, in the 2nd World War helped to protect the country from aerial attacks along with North Weald, Biggin Hill and other RAF stations in the south east.



Who knows, Captain Robinson, a real hero in his time who was awarded the Victoria Cross, may have touched down at Fyfield before his untimely death from the Spanish Flu epidemic in 1918.

June 25th 70 years ago The Tiger-Striped Marauders Arrive



The 387th Bombardment Group (Medium) was one of eight U.S. Army Air Force B-26 equipped medium bomber groups deployed in the European Theatre of Operations during World War II. Known as the "Tiger-Striped Marauders" or "Tiger Tails" because of the distinctive diagonal yellow and black stripes painted on the tails of its aircraft. The group was comprised of four tactical squadrons: the 556th, 557th, 558th and 559th Bombardment Squadrons, Medium. In England the group was first assigned to the Eighth Air Force, VIII Air Support Command, 3rd Bombardment Wing and stationed at the newly built airfield between Ongar, Fyfield and Willingale. The group flew its first mission, a diversion, on July 31 and its first bombing mission on August 15. The Eighth Air Force saw its mission as a strategic one aimed at destroying the German capacity to make war and thus wanted to focus on long-range missions against industrial targets deep inside

Germany. Although the twin-engined B-26s carried the same bomb load and flew faster than the four-engined heavy bombers, they had a much shorter range. Accordingly, during its tenure with the Eighth Air Force the bulk of the group's missions were attacks on Luftwaffe airfields in occupied France and Belgium intended to relieve pressure on the heavy bombers. The Martin B-26 Marauders affectionately were and alternatively known as the 'Flying Coffins', 'Widow Makers', 'Flying Torpedo' and 'Flying Pigs'.

Chipping Ongar airfield, designated Station 162, (Matching Green was Station 168) was the home to over 2700 USAAF personnel who must have made a huge effect on Ongar, Fyfield, Willingale and the other local villages for the short time that they were there. They left for France in July 1944.

How they travelled to Chipping Ongar.

The Air Crews went to Selfridge Field, Michigan to pick up new B-28's on May 23, 1943 where they proceeded to fly to Chipping Ongar as follows:

a. To Hunter Field, Savannah, Georgia for B-28 modifications and is the official Port Debarkation - 8/10/43.

b. To Langley Field, Virginia - 12/6/43.

c. To Presque Isle, Maine but had to land at Grenier Field, New Hampshire because of bad weather 14/6/43 and left on 16/6/43.

d. To Goose Bay, Labrador on 19/6/43.

e. To BW1, Greenland on 20/6/43.

f. To Iceland on 21/6/43.

g. To Prestwick, Scotland on 23/6/43.

h. To Aldernaston, England on 24/6/43.

i. Arrived Chipping Ongar, England on 25/6/43.

The Ground crews proceeded to **Chipping Ongar as follows:**

a. To Camp Kilmer, New Jersey via train on 10/8/43.

b. To New York City to board the troop ship "Queen Mary" on 22/6/43.

c. Sailed for Firth of Clyde, Scotland on 23/6/43.

d. Arrived Gourock, Scotland on 29/6/43.

e. Arrived Chipping Ongar, England on 30/6/43.

What remains of the airfield can be seen on the upper left hand side of this 1947 photo.

Letter from the Reverend Christine Hawkins



I want to begin this letter by thanking the 40 people who attended the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on 8 April. It was a record turnout for Fyfield and it was

heart-warming to see so many people interested in the life of our church. Thank you all.

There were many questions about the church's finances. It was clear that people were not aware of how much money the church needs to raise each year in order to stay open. Several of those attending stated that they would be willing to support the church, financially, through regular giving (via Standing Order for example). The PCC and I appreciate those generous offers.

Some of those attending the meeting offered to serve on the Parochial Church Council (PCC) for St Nicholas. I was encouraged that folk desire to serve in this way, however, the Church of England's Church Representation Rules state that only communicant members of the church may serve on the PCC. Furthermore, individuals who wish to stand for election to the PCC may only do so after they have been on the church's Electoral Roll for six months. Therefore, sadly, we are unable to admit people to the PCC at the present time. I am pleased to tell you that the Archdeacon of Harlow and our Area Dean will be meeting with the current PCC very soon, to listen to them and to discuss some options for the future of St Nicholas. I will be in a better position to follow-up all the offers of help and support after that meeting. Meanwhile, please know that both the PCC and I are grateful to all of those who came to the meeting, or who have contacted me to convey their concerns for the church and their desire that it should be kept as a place of worship for the village.

It seems that there are rumours that the church is going to close. Please be assured that has **never** been discussed and that neither the PCC nor I wish to see the church closed. The purpose of my letter in the last magazine was to be honest about the outlook for St Nicholas and to seek a response from the village. Clearly, the letter achieved its objective and I could not be more pleased that it did. Congregation numbers have improved since the APCM and that is hugely encouraging.

Whilst writing, I would like to apologise for the closure of the church on Easter Sunday. Unfortunately, I was taken ill on the Monday of Holy Week and remained unwell for two weeks. Despite the efforts of neighbouring clergy in our Mission and Ministry Unit (MMU) nobody else was available at the time to officiate on Easter Sunday. It was agreed that everyone in our two benefices should worship at St Mary Magdalen in Magdalen Laver as that service was already scheduled. I appreciate that a few residents of Fyfield were unhappy with the decision to move the service, but I hope you will all understand that every effort was made to find cover but, sadly, to no avail. Those who attended worship at Magdalen Laver were delighted to be there to celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The congregation numbered over 100 people and many of them commented how joyous it was to part of such a large crowd of worshippers.

We are still in the season of Easter. There is much to give thanks for and to celebrate in our beautiful village. Signs of new life are all around us at this time of year. I trust that our faithful, patient and loving God will walk alongside all of us as we discuss the future of our beloved church; that all things are in God's hands; that God creates nothing in vain and that, in the end, all shall be well if we can just keep faith with our great God of new beginnings.

It is hoped that through the coffee mornings a support network can be established which will in turn offer an understanding ear or friendly face when needed as well as providing information on the services available to assist carers. If you, or anyone you know, would benefit from this initiative then please do come along.

Our first two coffee mornings coincide with Carers Week, organised by Carers UK, and will be held at Ongar Health Centre on Monday June 10th and Friday, June 14th (11am-noon). We plan to hold more coffee mornings in the future.

Our Chair, Jenny Juttner, together with our Secretary Roberta Abbott, were very grateful to have been invited to speak at the Ongar and District Healthcare League of Friends AGM. It was a great opportunity to speak about the PPG and to also learn more about the role of the League of Friends.

The surgery has had many items of equipment purchased by the charity over the years, and their continued support is of great benefit to all patients.

The PPG recently published the third edition of its newsletter. The newsletter is

also available in digital format and patients who have registered to receive the enewsletters electronically will have received this by email. If you are not yet on our digital distribution list and would like to sign up to receive the e-newsletters, please email <u>ongarppgnews@gmail.com</u> Alternatively, hard copies are available at the surgery and we are looking to increase our hard copy distribution points soon.

Hopefully you will have heard that Ongar Health Centre is now one of the locations from which out-of-hours hub appointments in the area can be booked. The appointments are available between 8am and noon on a Saturday and must be pre-booked. The surgery itself will not be open and only those with pre-booked appointments will be able to enter the ground floor of the building.

The PPG is very pleased that out-of-hours appointments are being offered in Ongar as we are a large patient population and until now, patients of the practice have had to travel to other areas for such appointments. As with anything, the provision of the service will be guided by demand so please do use the service if it would be of use to you. If demand for the service proves to be high, then this could add weight to calls for greater out-of-hours availability in Ongar.

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

She gave a broad overview of the variety of wildlife inhabiting our rivers and riverbanks accompanied by magnificent photographs. As well as photographing animals and plants, Liz also showed several artistic shots featuring reflections from the surface of moving She delighted us all by giving water. insights into how she captured these magnificent images, telling us about the equipment that she uses and the techniques involved.

One of Liz's photographs of a Kingfisher is shown below. Naturally, the original is in full colour and extremely lifelike. Other photographs that she showed included water voles, otters, pike, grass snakes, butterflies and pond skaters, together with many of her favourite birds, such as buzzards, herons, egrets and swallows.

As you will see elsewhere in the Focus, Cllr. Les Lamb and Cllr. Jan Hall are now Chair and Vice Chair respectively and I am sure that you will give them your full support as you have given me over the past eight years.

Despite this unsettled period the EFDC has continued to perform very well at looking after the best interests in the area, which to remind you, extends from Waltham Abbey in the west to Willingale in the east and Matching in the north to Chigwell in the south. Some of the achievements worth mentioning are:

- Zero Council Tax increase in 9 of the last 10 years
- Funding of three Police Officers based in the Civic Offices to give priority to our area
- Investing in leisure centres in Waltham Abbey, Ongar and a new centre in Epping
- The current council housing stock of 6500 to be increased by 300 in the next 5 years
- Discussions with Essex County Council to devolve some Highway responsibilities to EFDC so that we have more control
- Discussions with other local councils to plan to benefit from the Oxford/Cambridge Arc by promoting economic development in our area

On top of these things the members are also responsible for scrutiny of the strategy and decisions made by the staff of the EFDC in the course of providing a service to the community.

Fyfield Parish Council – Annual Report 2018

Who Are We

- Your Councillors are local residents who volunteer their time to try to make our village a better and safer place to live.
- There are seven Councillors and a salaried Parish Clerk.
- There is a Council Election every four years and an internal Council election of the Chairman and Vice Chairman at the Annual General Meeting.
- The Parish Clerk is appraised on performance and re-appointed each year.

Managing Your Council

- Your Council meets monthly using a published agenda and provides meeting minutes. You can read these on the Parish Notice Board and on the Council Website.
- The meetings are open to residents who have the opportunity to speak and raise questions and/or issues.
- Because tax payers' money is involved there are strict legal processes to follow and our Parish Clerk ensures we follow them to the letter!
- Decisions made, financial controls and management of the Council processes are subject to internal and external audit.

Some Key Responsibilities

- Review Planning Applications and feedback concerns from Councillors and residents to the Epping Forest District Council (EFDC) Planning Office. Note that your Council have no powers to either approve or deny a planning application.
- Although your Council **have** no powers to prioritise the work of the Highways, Police, Planning and Environmental agencies we do communicate with them often and try to progress local issues.
- Ensure the sports field and church grounds are well maintained, dog bins emptied and the play area **is** safe to use.
- Progress initiatives and propose new projects concerned with the village and the wellbeing of residents.
- Represent the Council in other organisations and committees e.g. Fyfield Village Hall and Dr. Walkers School.
- Ensure tax payer funds are wisely spent on local matters.

Highlights For 2018

• Illegal Encampment

In early 2018 your Council dealt with an illegal encampment of travellers on the sports field. They were quickly removed thanks to the team work of your Council, Fyfield Village Hall, Essex Police and EFDC. Our Parish Clerk advised the Council that without the focused efforts of all involved the travellers could have been encamped there for weeks; stating that in other parishes it has cost many thousands of pounds to remove them and clear up the mess. Although the sports field was left in a terrible mess thanks to volunteers and specialist workers from EFDC all the rubbish was removed in time for a wedding in the village hall.

Health and Wellbeing

- Your Council started a Film Club where residents can watch a film and have lunch. It's proven to be a real success with people socialising and having a good time.
- Your Council fully supports the EFDC Lifewalks programme and 13 walks were held in 2018. These help people from all over the Epping district to improve their fitness.
- A further 12 informal village walks were organised for residents to explore our beautiful rural countryside.
- Your Council supports a programme to improve our footpath network. Our 22 miles of paths and bridges have been transformed in 2018 due to the work of your Councillors in co-operation with landowners, West Essex Rambles and Essex Highways.

Environment

 Issues with flooding on the Dunmow Road continues to be a problem. The Fyfield Parish Council (FPC) is in regular contact with Essex Highways and the Environment Agency, but it is very frustrating that no real progress has been made. It's an on-going issue the FPC will keep working on.

Crime prevention

- Your Council joined Fyfield to the regional Neighbourhood Watch scheme. You may have noticed new Neighbourhood Watch signs installed on the roads into Fyfield.
- Also we have recently joined forces with Moreton and there are now 280 people reading and posting crime and other information onto our members' only Facebook page.
- Your Council facilitates the "Coffee with Cops" sessions at the village hall. It's your chance to talk directly to police officers about issues that concern you and our village and also share experiences.

Financial Highlights

- The Council invested in new playground equipment and picnic benches.
- We identified that the charge for a burial was much lower in Fyfield than in other local parishes. So a tough decision was made in 2018 to increase the charges to be in line with those of Ongar.


Building Developments

 During 2018 the Council kept a close eye on the development of the EFDC Local Plan. There was a significant change made by EFDC for Fyfield in cancelling a larger development for the proposed smaller Gypsy Mead site.

Council Focus For 2019

- Your Council are committed to keeping the sports field and playground equipment well maintained for your enjoyment. However, the income generated is small compared to the costs and this is a concern going forward. The Council and the village hall are working together to identify opportunities to increase the use of the sports field and village hall to generate more income. If you have ideas for social events, sporting activities or would like to volunteer to help please let us know. PLEASE help us by coming to the various events being organised for you in 2019.
- Ensure maintenance contracts provide good value for money.
- Ensure planning applications, in particular Gypsy Mead, are assessed and feedback submitted to the EFDC Planning Department.
- Within a short time the church burial grounds are likely to reach capacity. The Council will survey the grounds and develop a long term plan.

- Create a Parish Appraisal questionnaire for residents to give their views on what's important for Fyfield going forward.
- Assess the benefits and potential location of a memorial tree area.
- Assess the best use of Council owned land.
- Continue the voluntary work in support of Council run initiatives such as the Film Club, Christmas tree event, Neighbourhood Watch, Footpath Improvements and Lifewalks.





Meadowland: The Private Life of an English Field

by John Lewis-Stempel

John-Lewis Stempel is a farmer and an award-winning writer predominantly known for his books on nature and history. He lives in Herefordshire, with his wife and two



children, on the very edge of England before it runs into Wales, and within a stone's throw (*with a decent gust of wind*) from where his family were farming in the 1300s.

Meadowland gives a unique and intimate account of an English meadow's life from January to December, together with its biography. In exquisite prose, John Lewis-Stempel records the passage of the seasons from cowslips in spring to the hay-cutting of summer and grazing in autumn, and includes the biographies of the animals that inhabit the grass and the soil beneath: the badger clan, the fox family, the rabbit warren, the skylark brood and the curlew pair, among others. Their births, lives, and deaths are stories that thread through the book from first page to last. There is barely a creature in *Meadowland* that we didn't learn at least one interesting new fact about (*the occasional tendency of badgers to hold funerals for one another is a particular favourite*).

Not only is this book beautifully written, it is full of amazing observations and great knowledge. A normal person looks at a field and sees grass, weeds, hedges, trees, possibly a few bugs and nondescript birds flying tree-to-tree. Mr. Lewis-Stempel breaks that top-level view down and explains what is actually happening below the surface. I can no longer take my daily walk with Martha, through our nearby meadow, without looking at it in a completely different way.

The book is interspersed with poetry, folk lore and historical snippets of country living and farm life. The author is obviously very well-read and much is drawn from his own love of the land, memories and considerable knowledge and experience.

We all loved this book!!

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The Beaver Scout Colony - 5 and three quarters to 8 years old-Tuesday 6.00pm to 7.15pm

After a busy Spring Term, the Beavers were awarded two activity badges. The first was their Safety Badge. This involved:

- Learning their Green Cross Code and having a practical demonstration in Ongar High Street by using the pedestrian crossing;
- The Water Safety Code;
- Knowing what to do if approached by a stranger
- Identifying dangers around their homes and explaining how to deal with them
- Knowing what to do in the event of a fire, taking part in a fire drill and understanding how to get help from the emergency services.

The second activity badge they all gained was the Global Issues badge. The syllabus for this badge was:

- Learn about how to save energy or recycle. Decide on three ways your Colony could save energy or recycle to help save the environment.
- Try different Fairtrade products and talk about the benefits of Fairtrade to the world.
- Learn about endangered animals and transform your Colony into endangered animals by making

masks or costumes. Why are they endangered and how could we save them? This included polar bears, Siberian tigers, white rhinos, mountain gorillas and loggerhead sea turtles.

• Use a bottle to create a water filter using sand and pebbles. Talk about the problems some people have finding clean and safe drinking water

They have all worked and played hard and nearly all the older Beavers have gained challenge awards as well.

Four Beavers swum up to Cubs on the 7th May and Charlie Long, Henry Petterson and Charlie Cook were awarded their Bronze Award.

The Beaver leaders are planning to spend as much time on outside activities this summer term and this will finish with a sleepover on the 6th and 7th July.

The Colony has two spaces for any child aged between five and three quarters and seven years old. Several of the Beavers will be attending the Scout Groups Family camp with their parents and siblings in June. This will mean more activities to go towards their Challenge Awards.

Cub Scouts – 8 to 10 and a half years – Thursday 7.00pm to 8.30pm

Scouts - 10 to 14 years of age -Friday 7.30pm to 9.30pm Explorer Scouts - 14 to 18 years old - Tuesday 7.30 to 9.30pm The older sections of the Scout Group the Cubs, Scouts and Explorer Scouts and the leaders - have all been preparing for the Waltham Walk which is an incident hike run by the Boys Brigade and 2019 is its 50th year. Our Scout Group have taken part in this event since 2002. From the start of the term they have been learning map reading skills, writing out route cards, and gaining practical experience using local walks. The older Scouts and Explorer Scouts practised Trangia cooking and the Cubs tried out their menu for the evening meal of pasta and bolognese sauce. The Cubs learnt how to put up the hike tents they would be sleeping in which was a new experience for the younger group.

Participating this year, we had ten Cub Scouts, seven Scouts, three Explorer Scouts, three leaders and three parents in seven teams.

This event is run over two days and includes twelve incidents at the twelve checkpoints along the route. These are varied incidents, normally team building exercises, some skills based and some strength based. All the teams were given a map reference for the next checkpoint once they had completed their incident. They then set the route they were to follow. When they arrived at checkpoints the teams had points gained or deducted for timing and they also lost points for the number of years they had entered the Waltham Walk.

All our seven teams really enjoyed this experience. The Teenie Trek (*under 12 years*) and the Mini Trek (*12 to 14 years*)

all hiked 9.9 miles on the Saturday and another 8.1 miles on the Sunday.

The three Teenie Trek teams comprising 10 cubs and 1 scout were remarkable. They had an adult walking with them to help with the map reading, but only the young people took part in each incident as the adults walking with each team were in supervisory roles.

All the teams camped in hike tents at Skreens Park activity centre in Roxwell. Paul Speller and Sarah came to Skreens Park and cooked the evening meal for the Cubs and helped them with their tents as they were all very tired after their 9.9-mile hike. The Mini Trek and Explorer Scout Teams cooked with Trangia's and had ration packs.

The Scout leaders - Rolf and Jack and Steve all managed the Veterans hike (*a one-day hike*) which was 16 miles on the Saturday.

The Explorer Scouts also hiked the 16 miles that first day but with full packs. They completed the 8.1 miles on the Sunday also with full packs. The route they followed on Saturday was from High Easter Village Hall to Pleshey Village Hall, then to Chignal Smealey Church before heading to Great Newarks and Newlands Hall before finishing at Skreens Park Activity Centre. On the Sunday morning they started from Skreens Park, headed to Blows farm and then to Hands farm, after this checkpoint they walked to Parsons Spring and then on to Mill Green Common finishing at Blackmore Village Hall.

Once all the teams had arrived, checked in, handed in their checkpoint cards and the items they had to collect on the way, there was a BBQ for all the competitors.
